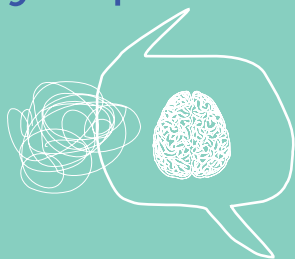


# /asia pacific art and mental health symposium/
