Starting from Wednesday 7 April 2021, the Ophelia Training Program will include 12 online sessions which include information, resources and opportunity to explore your own clinical practice. The weekly sessions will be Wednesdays 1pm Suva and NZ, 11am AEST, 60 minutes.

The OPHELIA Training is an online project with all fees waived, and administration costs provided in kind. All health workers delivering Child and Youth Mental Health Services in Pacific countries are welcome to participate in the 12 weekly sessions.

Please seek approval from your workplace, that you will be supported to participate in the 12 weekly sessions. The sessions are open for all health care workers, no set qualifications, or prior experience with Pasifika Study Group (PSG) or iCAMHS required.

Overview:

The online program includes:

1. 12 weeks of online sessions, focusing key aspects of child and adolescent mental health.
2. A structured approach to learning via reflective practices and peer exchanges.
3. Opportunity to integrate training and clinical models, and recognise the importance of the multidisciplinary workforce.
